General description of the course

Western university students bring with them a lot of preconceived ideas about Africa, even though it is a little-known continent. Those who can situate some key dates or facts about the history of Africa do not usually realise they are mere examples in European-centred narratives. African narratives of African history and global events are absent from European universities. This class is designed to present alternative historical tools and narratives that will enable students to integrate Africa in global history, but also to look at world history from the perspective of African actors. In this class we will learn about the specificities of African history but also use them as a stepping stone to explore global history and challenge the classical writing of history.
